All qualified voters of the school district are eligible to vote and absentee ballot applications are available now. Our proposed budget is on page 2 and copies are available in the library. In addition to approval of our yearly funding, voters will elect three trustees for threeyear terms. Meet the four candidates on page 3.

In December, all libraries in the system migrated to a new automated computer system and patrons can now pay overdue fines online, keep a history of their reading and specify the location at which they pick up reserved items. - chartered to serve 4,991 (2010 census)
- had 2,756 registered borrowers
- was open 59 hours per week in fall,
 winter & spring and 54 hours in summer
- had 124,361 total holdings, including 90,866 in electronic materials
- circulated 43,319 items, including 10,275 children's materials
- borrowed 8,514 items from other libraries
- loaned 10,119 items to other libraries
- added 2.160 new items to our shelves
- provided computer access to 10,500 users
- had free wireless access to the internet

Once upon a time, FPL, like most libraries, was staffed with part-time Library Clerks. That changed this year when four of our clerks qualified with Civil Service as Library Assistants. Our policy is to help employees reach the highest title for which they are eligible. The Library Assistant position requires a bachelor's degree. All six of our regular part-time adult staff members have this level of education plus three of them have master's degrees, as well. Our L.A.'s are triathletes in our world - they staff the front desk, conduct programs and help patrons with technology. At FPL, we believe that you can never be too qualified when it comes to serving the community.
